Passport Instructions

You will need:

- Printer
- Scissors
- Glue
- Stapler or sticky tape

Here's what to do:

- Print out all three of the passport pages.
- Cut each page in half along the dotted lines so you end up with six pieces of paper.
- Fold each page along the solid lines.
- 4. Glue the backs of the pages with the front and back covers and the welcome message and map together.
- Now put the remaining folded pages inside the front and back covers so that the pages with the quiz appear in the centre. Then staple or tape everything together to finish off your passport.
- You'll also need to cut out the passport stamps below. Each time you find an object in your passport, you can stick a stamp next to it.
























This symbol is known as the Khanda - it represents a double-edged sword which appears at its centre







